Community Input (Questions-Q, Answers-A, Comments-C)

Invasive Species:

- Q. What should homeowners be doing related to invasive species?
- A. Help with monitoring, don't dump any garden waste in ESA's, choose plant species wisely, contact UTRCA ESA staff with any questions, visit www.ontarioinvasiveplants.ca for more information on choosing or identifying species.
- Q. Is there an issue with tall ornamental grasses?
- A. Yes, many are invasive such as Phragmites, visit this site for native species http://www.ontarioinvasiveplants.ca/files/GMI Booklet spreads 2011 Final web.pdf
- Q. Is Garlic Mustard a problem in the bog
- A. Yes
- Q. Is there an Adopt an ESA Program at Sifton bog?
- A. Yes
- Q. What was the largest Goldfish removed from Redmond's Pond
- A. 9 inches
- C. Concern about hydro (London Hydro) staff clearing under hydro line on west side of bog. Concern if there is buckthorn in this area.
- Q. Can the City recommend cutting considerations for under the hydro line?

Deer:

- Q. What is the current status of deer in the bog?
- A. Number of deer in the bog has diminished there is a carrying capacity of 10 deer in the bog. Currently fewer than 10 deer in the bog, "not feeding deer" message seems to be getting out to the public.
- Q. Are there any results from the deer exclosure study?
- A. No, to date the results have been inconclusive.

Water Monitoring:

- Q. Are the old piezometer water monitoring stations still being used?
- A. Yes, and more stations are being added in the lagg zone
- Q. Are the water levels changing over time?
- A. The bog water cycle is dependent upon precipitation and evapotranspiration and there was some drainage in the past.
- Q. Where was the Kirk Drain?
- A. It was a tile drain graded to flow to the Thames River to allow peat harvest and growing celery in the bog many years ago. This drain has been capped for many years.
- Q. Is the old City well on lower Old Hyde Park Road still in use?
- A. This well remains as a groundwater resource and back up well for the City.

Land Use:

- Q. Has the City of London been able to acquire the land immediately to the east of Sifton Bog?
- A. No, several attempts have been made with the landowner to purchase the property without success to date.
- Q. Is there a valve on the east side of the bog for bringing more surface water to the bog from the development area?
- A. Yes, if more water is necessary for the bog, a valve can be opened to obtain roof water from the houses in this area.

Trails:

- C. The boardwalk to Redmond's Pond will need attention in 3-4 years. As the boardwalk is in a nature reserve zone, will need to determine the future of this boardwalk. The cost of replacement is high.
